## HURRICANE IAN STORM TIMELINE

#### THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 29

Randolph EMC activated its Storm Response Plan in anticipation of impacts to its service area in Randolph, Moore, Montgomery, Chatham, and Alamance counties. Ian made landfall over Florida as a Category 4 hurricane.

"Our crews stand ready to respond to the effects of this tropical event," said Randolph EMC CEO Dale Lambert. "I encourage our members, also, to make preparations."

#### FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 30

Ian made its second U.S. landfall, this time near Georgetown, S.C., as a Category 1 Storm. Members began to experience scattered outages as weather conditions deteriorated. The remnants of Ian brought strong wind gusts, bands of heavy rain and isolated flash flooding to central North Carolina.

By 7:30 p.m. Friday, REMC reported 117 outages affecting over 3,800 members. Crews worked through the night to restore power.

#### SATURDAY, OCTOBER 1

At 9 a.m., REMC crews worked to restore power to approximately 3,879 members in all 5 counties of the service area. Line personnel battled fallen trees and downed power lines amid saturating rains and strong winds.

Additional line personnel from sister cooperatives Union Power and Edgecombe-Martin County EMC in North Carolina, along with personnel from Sumter Utilities in South Carolina, arrived early that morning to join REMC line crew and contractors in restoration efforts. REMC appreciates the patience of our members and their positive thoughts and prayers as our lineworkers worked through the storm.

Lineworkers made significant progress throughout the day to restore power to members.

By 10 p.m., REMC reported only 75 members without power. Crews planned to work through another night to complete complex repairs caused by storm damage.

By late Saturday, Ian had tracked out of the REMC service territory and into Virginia as a significantly weakened system.

#### SUNDAY, OCTOBER 2

By the early hours of Sunday morning, all members in Randolph, Moore, Montgomery, Chatham and Alamance counties had their power restored. During the Ian event, Randolph Electric experienced a total of 268 separate outages, affecting 10,736 meters. This meant that the storm impacted about 32 percent of REMC's members.

"I am happy to report that as of 5:19 a.m. today, 100 percent of our members have power," said Dale Lambert, CEO. "I am proud and appreciative of our line personnel and support team for going the extra mile for our members."

"About one-third of our members experienced an outage from this storm. As always, our team worked as safely and efficiently as possible to repair the damage," continued Lambert.


When you see the change, remember it's not a new charge or an increase. Rather, we have unbundled the charges. If you have a question about this, please call us, and we will be happy to help you.

REMC's Grid Access Charge covers a portion of all costs associated with giving you access to the grid. It keeps electric distribution equipment up to date and operating properly. It also covers trained staff who respond to issues and keep electricity flowing safely to your home or business. The charge includes all of these elements:

## THE IMPORTANCE OF YOUR VOTE

#### Dear Members,

We are nearing a very important time in the life of our nation. The upcoming election is a time when we select citizens, from among us, to be our representatives in government. In this month's Watts Working, we have provided you with a listing of the legislative candidates who wish to serve you in Raleigh and Washington. I want to encourage you, if you are not already, to be the most important part of the election process—a voter.

What is the importance of voting? In a free country, where the people have the opportunity to choose our governmental leadership, it would seem this would be a question that is asked by only a few. Voting allows us to choose able leaders who have qualities that can be beneficial for the growth of the country, to guard our national security and to protect the liberties and interests of the common people.

Another reason voting is important is that it creates a sense of responsibility in our elected leaders. Knowing they have been chosen over another candidate and expected to carry out their duties in a professional, dedicated and sincere manner, holds them accountable for their actions for the
